

NEIGHBOURHOOD CIL APPLICATION FORM 2019

What's Neighbourhood Community Infrastructure Levy (CIL)?

Neighbourhood CIL is intended to help address the demands of a new development on the local area. This neighbourhood proportion is up to 25% of CIL receipts in areas with an adopted Neighbourhood Plan and up to 15% (capped at £100 per existing council tax dwelling) in areas without a Neighbourhood Plan. Therefore, if development occurs in an area, funds will be collected for the community to use to mitigate any impacts they have identified

At Solihull, a bidding system is open to communities to attempt to secure funding for projects that will benefit the local area. The fund total will be released annually, in April, and these funds will be open to bids until July 31st. Solihull MBC aim to fund the most appropriate projects (for an area), to ensure this, a screening application form will enable officers to best allocate funding. The funding will be become available once the ward allocation pot reaches £10,000.

Project Summary:

Penny's Youth Café is a church-sponsored community youth project to support local young people after school. It is open exclusively to young people aged 11-21. The project is established by the parish churches of Knowle, Dorridge and Bentley Heath to give young people a dedicated place to be where they can develop a sense of belonging. The café is situated in St John's Way in Knowle, operating from a previously vacant restaurant premise. It is supported by the churches and volunteers, accessible to young people from all faiths and none.

Mitigating the impact of Development

Please explain how your project will support development in the Neighbourhood, this could address a Social or a Physical need.

Penny's Youth Café is a project that gives young people ownership, engagement and support. Young people are welcome to find a safe place to develop friendships and access extra support. We aim to achieve this by running a sustainable café to provide a midweek after-school drop in for young people from local secondary schools.

The informal youth café will run from 3.30-6pm creating the opportunity for mentoring. There will also be regular youth church events running at the same premises, so young people can access extra pastoral support if needed.

The café will build on relationships developed with local young people from pilot café's run adhoc at different locations in Knowle since September 2017, where young people from all faiths and none have been welcomed and included.

By engaging young people as customers, members and volunteers, the café will not only draw young people into a caring environment after school, providing a bridge until adults are more likely to be home, but will build a sense of belonging and responsibility. These factors will reduce the opportunity for anti-social behaviour and isolation which many young people face the challenge of.

Penny's Youth Café is a church-based volunteer driven enterprise. Everyone involved is either funded already by local churches, or not paid. At this phase of the project, no one is paid by the café.

Young people will take a volunteer role supervising various areas of the café, serving behind the bar, managing the café, cleaning and caring for the site. This work will be augmented by a dedicated team of adults who will supervise, contribute and maintain a safe space.

The café will be stocked by local contributions of home baked cakes from volunteers, contributions from local businesses, and maintained by income from the café for other expenses.

In this way, local adults have a way to engage with local young people, reducing the intergeneration understanding gap, reducing fear, and finding new ways to relate to each other, helping active citizens grow.

Councillor Alan Rebeiro has confirmed his support for Penny's Youth Café.

Penny's Youth Café will be run by Knowle Parish Church and St Phillips and St James Church (Dorridge and Bentley Heath). The Youth team at Knowle Parish Church have been successfully running Youth Cafes since September 2017 at different venues within Knowle. Penny's Youth Café is being run by a team of over 40 volunteers who serve either at the café itself or by making cakes. All staff serving at the café have accessed training and are DBS checked. The risks are mitigated by ensuring that strict guidelines are followed for making drinks, cakes and offering support to young people accessing the café.

Will there be any on-going maintenance? How would this be funded?

The premises at 5 St. John's Way have been made available to Knowle Parish Church rentfree until June 2020 so any financial surpluses made from sales at Penny's Youth Café will be used to maintain the property and invest into the future development of the café. Penny's has received a number of gifts and donations from local residents and was seed-funded by a grant from Knowle Parish Church. West Midlands Police have suggested we have been awarded a £995 grant and further grant applications are in the process of being applied for.
